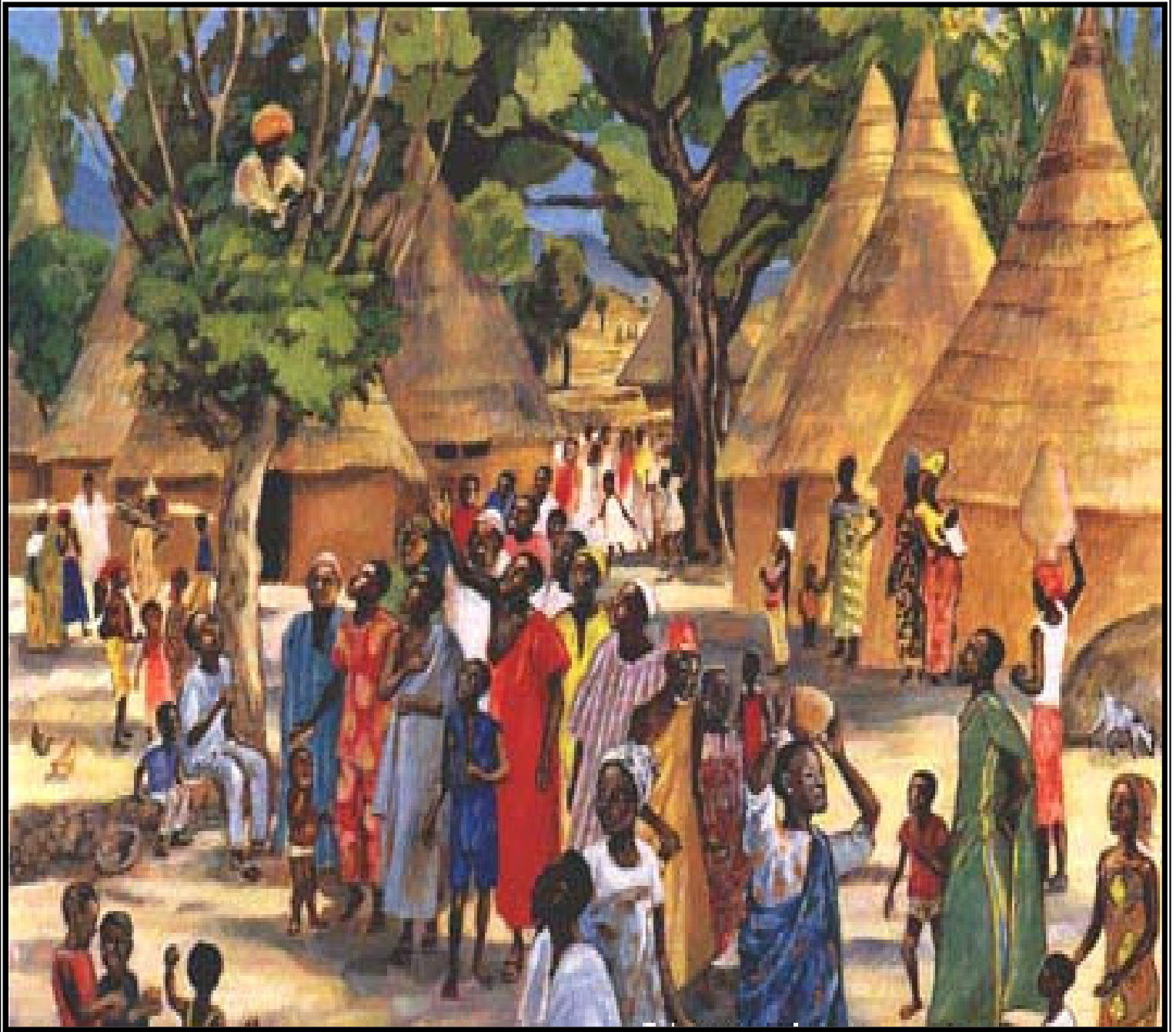

This week's second collection, the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), works to uphold the dignity of human life by breaking the cycle of poverty across the United States through grants to local community-based groups who create jobs, improve education, and strengthen neighborhoods. Twenty-five percent of the CCHD collection stays in the Archdiocese of Boston to fund local anti-poverty projects; seventy-five percent supports national grand and education programs. A Message from the Co-Pastors

Comparisons can be an odious thing. When I read a commentary on the gospel I recalled a situation that happened to me many years ago now when I was a freshman in high school. It happened in a Latin class when we were given a vocabulary quiz which I flunked. This being my first classical language I missed the point that you wrote the words, unlike English, with the accent marks. Needless to say because I included none of them I royally flunked. The teacher called me outside of the classroom and proceeded to compare me with my older brother who had gone through the school before me. Such a comparison can take two roads. One would be why bother I am not a good student in the first place. In other words it could be a giving up or a surrender to the inevitable. The other response was mine; I took it as a challenge. My brother and I were always in competition with each other. I was determined to make a name for myself.

You see I think the comparison we have in the gospel is bad as I do not think either person is the ideal. Like the story of Mary and Martha they both have qualities and flaws. What is looked for is a combination of both. Certainly the Pharisee is taken up with his own goodness. He practically canonizes himself; while putting down all the others. He recognizes he has good traits but seemingly sees no flaws or sins. God calls us to conversion, to change, to become but if we do not see any faults or sins the process is over before it begins and those around this person suffer the consequences.

While on the other hand the tax collector is well aware of his sinfulness but does not recognize any of his gifts. His self concept is bad and he cannot raise his eyes to heaven. God calls us to a conversion, to learn from our mistakes but he calls us to live life at the gift it is. If we think we are junk we will live life looking through those glasses and life will be anything but a gift.

Ideally what is God calling us all to? Like the Pharisee he wants us to recognize our gifts and to develop them but he also calls us to change; to recognize the flaws and change. On the other hand he does not want us to become victims of our sins or flaws but to learn from them. He does not want the flaw or the sin to outweigh the good. As I was praying about this the people that came to mind were Peter and Judas. Judas was overwhelmed with his sin that he could not recognize the positive and thus took his life. Peter, on the other hand, recognized the sin, learned from it but continued to develop the positive and became a leader of God's people.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Penance): Saturday 3:15 - 3:45 PM or anytime upon request.

Marriage: Couples preparing to marry here should contact the Parish House at least one year in advance of the proposed wedding date.
